The Outsiders Debate

Greasers are people who are mostly poor and are in gangs. They stick together and look out for each other. The Greasers were right for doing everything that they did including Ponyboy and Johnny not staying to take the blame of Bob's death. Furthermore, the Socials were responsible for Johnny's death. Finally, the primary theme for *The Outsiders* was "true friends are friends forever."

Ponyboy and Johnny should not have stayed to take the blame for Bob's death because it wasn't their fault. First of all, the Socials were drunk. This caused them to make very bad choices. He gave them money, told them where to hide, and told them what to get to take care of themselves while in the church. lastly, when Dally was so upset Johnny died, he robbed a bank. Pony received a call from him saying he needed them to hide him. The whole gang immediately was there for him even though he had made a bad decision. Sadly, they did not make it in time, but they were trying as hard as they could to get there. True friends do last

forever because if they didn't the gang never would have saved Ponyboy from being jumped outside the theater by the Socials, Dally wouldn't have risked his freedom by helping Ponyboy and Johnny run away, and the gang never would have tried to save Dally from the police.
