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## PALM SUNDAY



Jesus has entered Jerusalem. Our forty-day penitential journey nears completion. Lent ends when we begin the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday evening. Ash Wednesday seems like only yesterday. Have we answered the Lord's call to prayer, fasting and almsgiving? It's not too late! Our procrastination keeps good company. The apostles were also often slow to catch on to the Lord's revelations (see Jn 12:16). Don't despair. Cling to the Church's liturgical schedule over the upcoming week — it may turn out to be the best week of our lives. As we enter Holy Week, be eager to tell others about the amazing liturgies awaiting us. With the Psalmist say, "I will proclaim Your name to my brethren; in

the midst of the assembly I will praise You" (Ps 22:23). On Holy Thursday, be awed as Jesus ordains His first priests and gifts us His Body and Blood (see Lk 22:17-20). At the celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday, reflect on Jesus' sacrifice. "And it was thus that He humbled Himself, obediently accepting even death, death on a cross!" (Phil 2:8) Then rejoice with the Church as many new Catholics enter into full communion with His Body at Holy Saturday's Easter Vigil. Finish with a flourish on Resurrection Sunday, "for it was impossible that death should keep its hold on Him" (Acts 2:24). ## HOLY WEEK

### MASS OF THE LORD'S SUPPER

The night before He died, the Lord instituted the way He would remain with us forever. He could have remained with us in awesome majesty, in fire and cloud, as He did with the Israelites (Ex 19:16ff; 40:34-38). Instead, Jesus set aside His majesty and humbled Himself (Phil 2:6-8). He decided to remain with us in His Eucharistic Body and Blood. Jesus' Last Supper took place on the eve of the Jewish feast of Passover. The New Passover (1 Cor 5:7), the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, brings freedom from slavery to sin and from the tyranny of Satan and his kingdom of darkness. We are freed from sin and free to love God and to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters in Christ (1 Jn 3:16). Do you want Jesus to set you free? Then receive the Body and Blood of Jesus often at Mass. Receive His freeing, healing love. Then go forth to love and serve the Lord and His beloved people. *One Bread, One Body Presentation Ministries*



### GOOD FRIDAY - LITURGY OF THE LORD'S PASSION

When we venerate the cross today, may we be totally committed to Him, repentant of all sins, and zealous for everyone to know our crucified Savior's love. If obedience, repentance, and evangelization are not our responses to Jesus' sacrificial death, the cross of Christ is "rendered void of its meaning" (1 Cor 1:17). The Lord wants us to leave church today willing to suffer anything so as to lead as many as possible to Jesus (1 Cor 9:19). After what Jesus has done for us, we must be willing to die, if only we can lead someone to Him. The greatest need of a starving person is not food but Jesus, the Bread of life. The greatest need of a wounded person is not healing but the Healer. It is certainly true that we probably can't evangelize someone who has an empty stomach; however, eternal salvation is of the greatest importance. Jesus will provide our daily bread and heal our wounds. Our need is not primarily for what Jesus can do; our primary need is the need for Jesus Himself.

### EASTER MASS OF THE RESURRECTION

Today is one of the greatest days in our lives. Alleluia! When we believe in our hearts that Jesus is risen from the dead (see Rm 10:9), everything is transformed and made new. Death no longer overshadows Life. The fear of death no longer enslaves us (Heb 2:15). Death has lost its sting (1 Cor 15:55). Death is not our enemy but our friend; it is not so much the end, but the beginning. We have "full confidence



that now as always Christ will be exalted through" us, whether we "live or die" (Phil 1:20). For, to us, "life" means Christ; hence dying is so much gain" (Phil 1:21). Through Baptism and a life of faith, we have already "been raised up in company with Christ" (Col 3:1). We are "intent on things above rather than on things of earth" (Col 3:2). Now the main purpose of life is to be a witness that Jesus is risen from the dead (see Acts 10:41-42). Alleluia! Easter is new and now. *One Bread, One Body, Presentation Ministries*


### School Registration for New Families

He has established the Saturday evening anticipated mass for Divine Mercy Sunday, April 10, as the time for the ending of the general dispensation. He will officially announce this in his upcoming Catholic Times article. The bishop will end the dispensation but will put certain stipulations on the dispensation for some segments of the diocesan population, such as those over 65 years of age. I would highly recommend that we read the bishop's article to understand all of the ramifications of his decision, and how it will impact us individually.

### Mass Schedule for The Triduum & Easter

The most sacred and the last three days of Holy Week are known as the Triduum.

**On Holy Thursday** we will have the Mass of the Lord's Supper at **7:30 pm**. Following that service we will have **Adoration of the Lord in the Blessed Sacrament until 10:00 p.m.** Unlike years past where different hours were offered, according to your last name, this year anyone is welcome to attend during the 7:30—10:00 pm time frame.

**Good Friday** we will celebrate the Liturgy of the Lord's Passion at **7:30 pm**.

**Holy Saturday** we will welcome our Elect into the Church and proclaim the miracle of the Risen Christ with Mass at **7:30 pm**.

**Easter Sunday** we proclaim the miracle of the Risen Christ with Masses at **8:30 am and 10:30**.

### A Meditation on the Readings

Does the King of glory find a welcome entry in your home and heart? Jesus went to Jerusalem knowing full well what awaited him - betrayal, rejection, and crucifixion. The people of Jerusalem, however, were ready to hail him as their Messianic King! Little did they know what it would cost this



king to usher in his kingdom. Jesus' entry into Jerusalem astride a colt was a direct fulfillment of the Messianic prophecy of Zechariah (9:9): Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion. Shout aloud, O daughter of Jerusalem. Lo, your king comes to you; triumphant and

victorious is he, and riding on an donkey and upon a colt the foal of a donkey. Those who believe, hope, and love receive Christ's kingdom of peace and eternal life. The colt was a sign of peace. Jesus enters Jerusalem in meekness and humility, as the Messianic King who offers victory and peace to his people. That victory and peace would be secured in the cross and resurrection which would soon take place at the time of Passover. Augustine, the great 5th century church father, comments on the significance of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem: "The master of humility is Christ who humbled himself and became obedient even to death, even the death of the cross. Thus he does not lose his divinity when he teaches us humility... What great thing was it to the king of the ages to become the king of humanity? For Christ was not the king of Israel so that he might exact a tax or equip an army with weaponry and visibly vanquish an enemy. He was the king of Israel in that he rules minds, in that he gives counsel for eternity, in that he leads into the kingdom of heaven for those who believe, hope, and love. It is a condescension, not an advancement for one who is the Son of God, equal to the Father, the Word through whom all things were made, to become king of Israel. It is an indication of pity, not an increase in power." (Tractates on John 51.3-4)

Psalm 24 is another prophetic passage which echoes this triumphal procession of the King of glory: Lift up your heads, O gates! and be lifted up, O ancient doors! that the King of glory may come in. Jesus Christ came to bring us the kingdom of God. He is the true King who offers peace, joy, and everlasting life for those who accept his kingship. Does the King of glory find a welcome entry in your heart and home? Do your walls echo with the praise of his glory? "Lord Jesus, be the King and Ruler of my heart, mind, life, and home. May my life reflect your meekness and humility that you may be honored as the King of glory!"

### Palm Sunday, 'King of the Jews' (Mark 14:1-15:47)

They couldn't kill him for blasphemy, a religious crime Rome didn't recognize. But they could put him to death for a political crime like treason. So Jesus died under the accusation, "King of the Jews."

He had no throne, no army, no power to threaten governments. But he threatened a lot of people with the power to change hearts.
